

CDC offers guidelines for schools' sex education topics

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The federal Centers for Disease Control has identified 16 topics which it says should be included in sex education classes offered to high school students in the U.S. Fewer than half of high schools and only a fifth of middle schools teach all 16

middle schools teach all 16. The topics: —Benefits of being sexually abstinent. —How to access valid and reliable health information, products and services related to HIV, other <u>sexually transmitted diseases</u>, and pregnancy. —Influences of family, peers, media, technology and other factors on sexual risk behavior. —Communication and negotiation skills related to eliminating or reducing risk for HIV, other STDs, and pregnancy. —Goal-setting and decision-making skills related to eliminating or reducing risks.

—Importance of using a condom at the same time as another form of contraception to prevent both STDs and pregnancy.
