

## Lithium may protect against cartilage decline in osteoarthritis

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"LiCI reduced catabolic events in IL-1?-treated human articular chondrocytes and attenuated the severity of cartilage destruction in IL-1?-treated mouse femoral head explants and in the knee joints of mice with surgically induced OA," the authors write.

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(HealthDay)—Lithium reduces catabolic events in interleukin-1? (IL-1?)-treated human articular chondrocytes and protects against cartilage degradation in IL-1?-treated mouse knee joints, according to a study published in the May issue of *Arthritis & Rheumatology*.

Takeshi Minashima, Ph.D., from New York University, and colleagues treated human articular chondrocytes with lithium chloride (LiCl) and IL-1?. Real-time polymerase chain reaction then determined expression levels of catabolic genes. Additionally, the activation of NF-KB was determined using luciferase reporter assays. Immunoblot analysis of total cell lysates determined the activities of MAPKs and the STAT-2 signaling pathway.

The researchers found that LiCI treatment resulted in decreased catabolic marker messenger RNA levels and activation of NF-KB, p38 MAPK, and STAT-3 signaling in IL-1?-treated articular chondrocytes. LiCI also directly inhibited IL-6-stimulated activation of STAT-3 signaling. Eight weeks after osteoarthritis induction surgery, the severity of cartilage destruction in LiCI-treated mouse knee joints or in LiCI-treated mouse femoral head explants after IL-1? treatment were markedly reduced versus in vehicle-treated joints or explants.



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
